
See Film Made in Walden in Walden

The Josephine-Louise Public Library will host a very special film adaptation of the 1852 novel. The Blithedale Romance by American Nathaniel author Hawthorne. It is the third major "romance", as he called the form.

Edgar Allan Poe and Nathaniel Hawthorne are considered Romantic writers due to their focus on emotion, the supernatural, and human

nature. They often explored themes of good versus evil and the darker aspects of the human psyche, aligning with the Romantic period's emphasis on emotion and intuition over logic.

The Blithedale Romance setting is a utopian socialist farming commune based on Brook Farm, of which Hawthorne was a founding member and where he lived in 1841. The novel dramatizes the conflict between the commune's ideals and the members' private desires and romantic rivalries. It is a novel that explores themes of community, identity, and the complexities of human relationships

through the lens of utopian ideals. The novel critiques the limitations of idealism and the often harsh realities of personal ambition and emotional turmoil.

The plot: Idealistic reformers leave the city for a rural commune, hoping to transform society. Their goals clash with farm life's realities and personal ambitions. As individualism takes

over, the dream unravels,

leading to unforeseen consequences.

Director Cody Knotts filmed the adaptation in and around Walden's historical Jacob T. Walden House, using members of the Walden Historical Society as extras alongside the professional actors.
